## The Comptometer Inventory Form

In most businesses the perennial inventory is a nuisance, something avoided until the last minute and an item of considerable expense. Much of the nuisance and expense can be avoided by the use of proper forms and the observance of simple precautions.

This form is designed to centralize responsibility and give such accuracy that retaking of the inventory is obviated. Note perforated strip on right of form headed "Proof Extension". Original extensions are set down in this column and strip is detached; second figuring results are set down in column headed "Extension". Comparison of total of each column proves accuracy—if two totals do not agree, each extension can be compared to find wrong extension.

The observance of the following rules in taking of inventory will materially aid the operator in getting high speed and accuracy in extending.

### Quantity

In listing quantities be sure to indicate kind of units and number of units; i. e., 4 doz., 5 yds., etc.

### Prices

In writing prices in column headed Price, care should be taken to place dollars in the dollar column and cents in the cents column. Always write two naughts in the cents column when there are no cents, or use a dash (—).

### Fractions

Always write fractions thus  $\frac{1}{2}$ , not  $\frac{1}{2}$ , and in such manner that anyone can decipher them. Fractions of yard goods should be stated in eighths only; for example, 23- $\frac{1}{8}$ . Fractions of dozens should be stated in twelfths; for example,  $\frac{1}{12}$ ,  $\frac{6}{12}$ , etc.

### EXAMPLES

84,645# Freight at \$1.79 a Gross Ton.

First get answer in Gross Tons and without cancelling make the price extension. Write no figures on paper and remember no figures except 44643 (the reciprocal of 2240).

With \$350.70 in the register, in the permanent decimal point position, multiply it, *without first cancelling*, by the complement of .58663 (the net of  $33 \frac{1}{3} - 5 - 5 - 2 \frac{1}{2}$ ) so as to get the actual discount \$144.97.

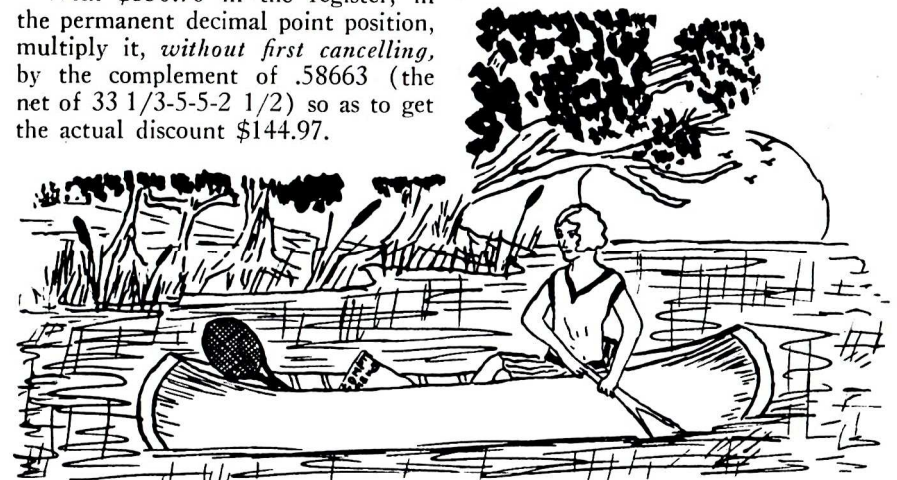
With \$144.97 in the register as in above example, subtract it, without cancelling, from the gross \$350.70, to get the net \$205.73.

Find salary for 6 hrs. and 37 minutes at \$132.64 a month of 26 days, 8 hrs. to the day. Answer \$4.22.

Get answer without a table and without cancelling, but just knowing that the reciprocal of  $60 \times 8 \times 26$  is 80128.

Loan of \$5000.00 payable at \$65.00 per month, which includes interest at 6% on monthly unpaid balances. How long to pay note in full? On request we will gladly supply you with an easy-to-follow *formula* so you can readily figure any problem like this in a few minutes.

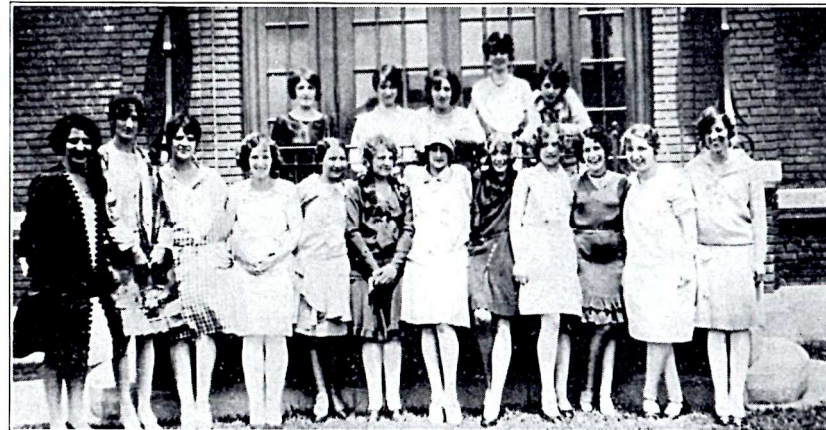

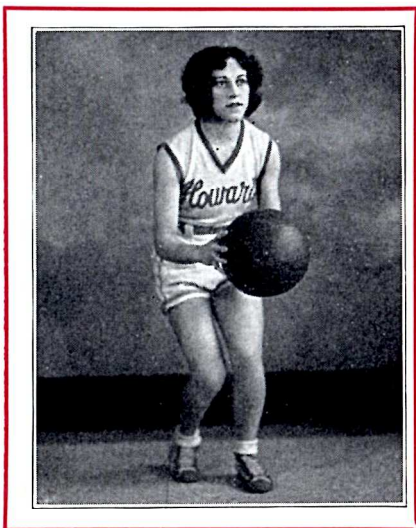

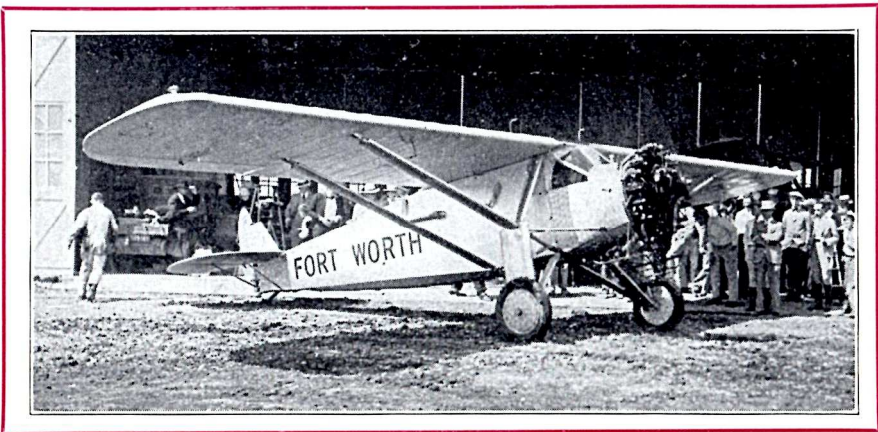

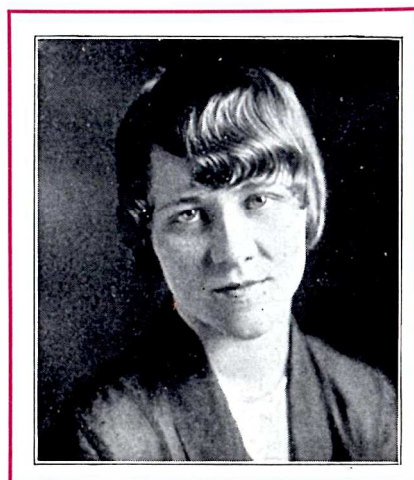

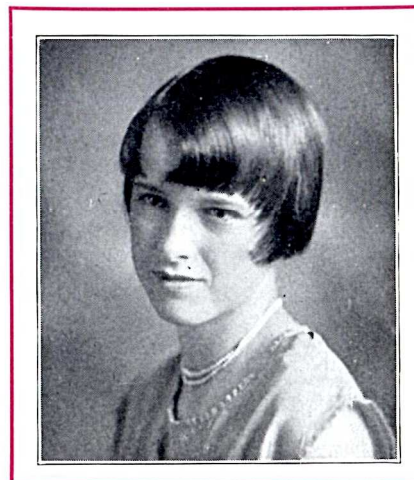

It seems to me that she is as efficient a restaurateur as she was a Comptometer chief and our best wishes go out to her in her new venture.

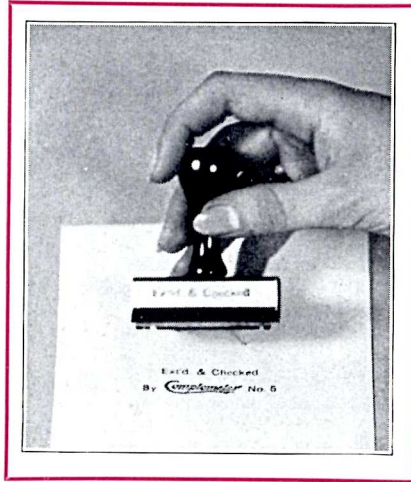

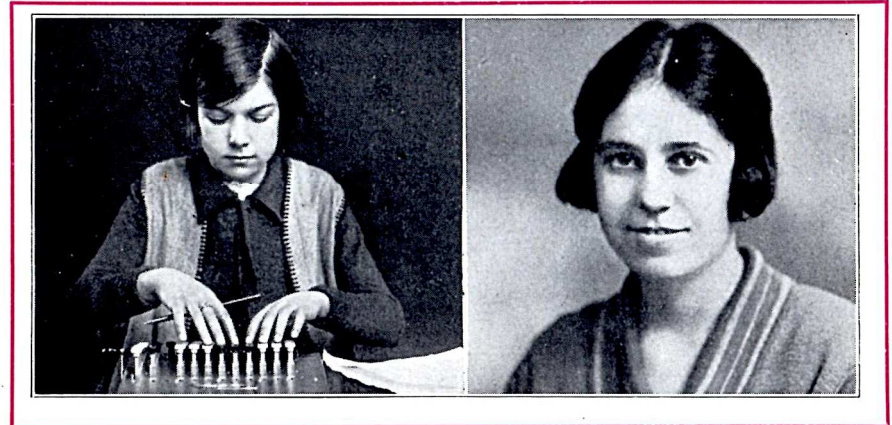

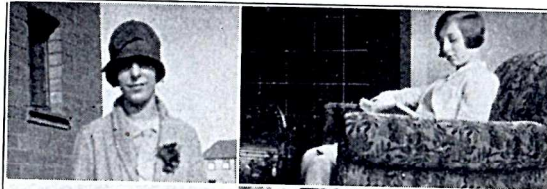
